PAUL SUTTER

Chief Scientist Center Of Science and Industry

For those who want to know how the universe works, Paul Sutter is a new, fresh voice in science communication. An astrophysicist, writer, speaker, producer, and on-air host everywhere from podcasts to TV, Paul strives to bring science to new audiences. By breaking down formidable concepts, emphasizing the human and artistic aspects of the scientific process, and making science accessible with his characteristic conversational, humorous approach, Paul is the one and only *Agent to the Stars*.



An established scientist, Paul has authored more than 60 academic papers on topics ranging from the earliest moments of the Big Bang, to the emptiest places in the universe, to novel methods for detecting the first stars. He received his Ph.D. in Physics in 2011 as a Department of Energy Computational Science Graduate Fellow, and prior to his current position he held research fellowships in Paris and Italy. He has given more than 100 seminars, colloquia and conference talks at institutions around the world.

Paul's *Ask a Spaceman* podcast invites listeners to send questions via social media to answer on the show; it is now one of the top podcasts across all subjects, globally. As a contributing editor to Space.com, his articles reach more than 100,000 readers and are syndicated to CBS News, Scientific American, MSN, and more. A go-to expert for journalists and producers, Paul regularly appears on radio, TV, and in print, and consults on film and TV productions.

Serving as the public face of science for COSI, he gives talks, speaks at shows, and makes appearances across Columbus,

### WD-40 ... Who knew?

I had a neighbor who bought a new pickup. One Sunday morning, I got up very early and saw that someone had spray-painted red all around the sides of his beige truck. I went over, woke him up, and told him the bad news. He was very upset, and was trying to figure out what to do ... probably nothing until Monday morning, since nothing was open.

Another neighbor came out and told him to get his WD-40 and clean it off. It removed the unwanted paint beautifully and did not harm his paint job that was on the truck. I was impressed!

WD-40, who knew? "Water Displacement #40." The product began from a search for a rust preventative solvent and degreaser to protect missile parts. WD-40 was created in 1953 by three technicians at the San Diego Rocket Chemical Company. Its name comes from the project that was to find a 'Water Displacement' Compound. The technicians were finally successful for a formulation, with their 40th attempt, thus WD-40. The Convair Company bought it in bulk to protect their Atlas missile parts. Ken East (one of the original founders) says there is nothing in WD-40 that would hurt you. When you read the 'shower door' part, try it. It's the first thing that has ever cleaned that spotty shower door. If yours is plastic, it works just as well as on glass. It's a miracle! Then try it on your stove-top. It's now shinier than it's ever been. You'll be amazed. Here are some common WD-40 uses:

- Protects silver from tarnishing.
- Cleans and lubricates guitar strings.
- Removes lipstick stains.
- Untangles jewelry chains.
- Removes dirt and grime from the barbecue grill.
- Removes tomato stains from clothing.
- Camouflages scratches in ceramic and marble floors.
- Removes grease splatters from stove-tops.
- Lubricates prosthetic limbs.
- Removes all traces of duct tape.
- Restores and cleans roof racks on vehicles.
- Lubricates noisy door hinges on both home and vehicles doors.
- Keeps the flies off of cows, horses, and other farm critters, as well. (Ya gotta love this one!!!)
- Remove those nasty bug guts that will eat away the finish on your car if not removed quickly!
- Lubricates gearshift and mower deck lever for ease of handling on riding mowers.
- Keeps rust from forming on saws and saw blades, and other tools.
- Lubricates wheel sprockets on tricycles, wagons and bicycles for easy handling.
- Folks even spray it on their arms, hands, and knees to relieve arthritis pain.
- The favorite use in the state of New York? It protects the Statue of Liberty from the elements.
- Use it for fire ant bites; It takes the sting away immediately and stops the itch.
- Also, if you've discovered that your teenage daughter has washed and dried a tube of lipstick with a load of laundry, saturate the lipstick spots with WD-40 and rewash.

- Removes road tar and grime from cars.
- Restores and cleans chalkboards.
- Loosens stubborn zippers.
- Removes stains from stainless steel sinks.
- Keeps ceramic / terracotta garden pots from oxidizing.
- Keeps glass shower doors free of water spots.
- Keeps scissors working smoothly.
- Keeps bathroom mirror from fogging.
- Keeps pigeons off the balcony (they hate the smell).
- Rids kids rocking chair and swings of squeaky noises.
- Lubricates and stops squeaks in electric fans.
- Gives floor that 'just-waxed' sheen without making them slippery.
- It removes that nasty tar and scuff marks from the kitchen flooring.
- Gives a children's playground gym slide a shine for a Super-fast slide.
- Lubricates tracks in sticking home windows and makes them easier to open.
