Nannette Maciejunes Executive Director Columbus Museum of Art



Nannette V. Maciejunes has served as executive director of the Columbus Museum of Art since November 2003. She is a graduate of both Stanford's Executive Program for Nonprofit Leaders and the Getty Leadership Institute for Museum Management (MMI). In 2006, Nannette Received both the Ohio Governor's Award for the Arts in the category of Arts Administration and the South Side Settlement House Spirit of Volunteerism Award. In 2009, Nannette was named a YWCA Woman of Achievement. Recently, she was named a 2015 Columbus Business First C-Suite Award Honoree.

Under Nannette's leadership, the Museum adopted and implemented the mission *to create great experiences with great art for everyone*. She was instrumental in CMA's acquisition of *The Photo League* collection and the *Philip J. and Suzanne Schiller Collection of American Social Commentary Art, 1930-1970*, which is considered to be the most important collection of its kind. In 2011, CMA opened the Center for Creativity, an innovative new space that demonstrates the museum's leadership in the field of the visitor-centered museum experience and commitment to creativity. In 2013, the CMA was awarded the Institute of Library and Museum Services' National Medal, the Nation's highest honor for museums. Nannette spearheaded the largest and most successful endowment and capital campaign in CMA's history. In October 2015, the museum completed its major renovation and expansion, which included the renovation of the historic 1931 building and the addition of a new 50,000 sq. ft. wing and sculpture garden. Due to the tremendous impact that the Margaret M. Walter Wing

Year-end giving ...

In this week's mail you will receive a request to include the Columbus Kiwanis Foundation's 1916 Society in your year-end giving plans. We hope we can count on your support.

Founded in 1970, the Columbus Kiwanis Foundation has as its mission providing grants and scholarships that support the Columbus community. A significant portion of the charitable expenditures made through the Club's committees are derived from the income earned on the total funds held by the Foundation. The Foundation is a 501(c) 3 charitable organization, making any contributions tax deductible to the full extent provided by law.

There are several ways you can contribute to the Foundation:

1916 Society – Contributions to this fund, by cash or check, are used for general Foundation programming and are not earmarked for any special purpose when deposited into the Foundation. Joining the Society requires an initial pledge of \$1,000, which, if desired, can be paid over a four-year period. Additional gifts of any amount will be recorded with recognition given when various levels are reached.

\$2,500 – Silver level
\$5,000 – Gold level
\$10,000+ – Platinum level

Endowed gift – You can endow a fund with a minimum contribution of \$10,000. Annual distributions from the fund can be made as directed by you in any written guidelines that have been pre-approved by the Foundation.

Bequest – It is never too soon to start thinking about estate planning. We have a number of Club members who can work with you to provide for a lump sum gift to the Foundation as part of your estate plan.

Insurance – Another possible way to contribute to the Foundation is by naming the Foundation as a beneficiary of an insurance policy.
