Nate Beeler is the editorial cartoonist for *The Columbus Dispatch*. Prior to joining the Ohio capital's newspaper in April 2012, the Columbus native drew cartoons for seven years in the nation's capital for *The Washington Examiner*.

Beeler's cartoons have appeared in such publications as *Time*, *Newsweek*, *U.S. News & World Report*, *USA Today*, *The New York Times* and the *Los Angeles Times*, among others. His work has been featured on CNN, MSNBC's "Hardball with Chris Matthews," and Fox News, where viewers of "The O'Reilly Factor" officially voted him a "Pinhead." Beeler is among the most widely syndicated editorial cartoonists, with his cartoons distributed internationally to more than 800 publications by Cagle Cartoons.

The National Press Foundation awarded Beeler the 2008 Clifford K. & James T. Berryman Award for Editorial Cartoons. The following year, he won the Overseas Press Club's Thomas Nast Award for best international cartoons. In 2007, Beeler won the Golden Spike Award, as voted upon by members of the Association of American Editorial Cartoonists. He has received top honors from the Virginia, Maryland and D.C. press associations for his cartoons.

Beeler's cartooning path began at his high school's student newspaper in Bexley. While on the way to graduating with a journalism degree from American University in 2002, he won the top college cartooning awards: the Charles M. Schulz Award, the John Locher Award and first place in the SPJ Mark of Excellence Awards.

Beeler lives in Bexley with his wife, Eve, and their 5-year-old son, Max.

Volunteer, help raise money, watch good golf ...

Kiwanis Club of Columbus has agreed to staff the drink concession tent at tee #4 during the week of The Presidents Cup, to be held October 1 through October 6 at Muirfield Village Golf Club. Eight percent of all sales will be divided proportionately among the volunteer groups who work that week. The proceeds we receive will be put toward the 1916 Society and our goal to raise an incremental \$100,000 to be awarded in grants during our centennial year in 2016.

Since its inception in 1994, The Presidents Cup has grown in size and stature to become one of the most eagerly awaited, highly watched events in all of golf. This golfing tournament pits the top players from the United States against an international team culled from the ranks of the finest golfers outside of Europe. The Presidents Cup, which will be played for the 10th time in 2013, was developed to give the world's best non-European players an opportunity to compete in international team match-play competition.

The Presidents Cup has grown from little more than an idea in the early 1990s to one of the most anticipated events on golf's global calendar. Along the way, this world-class competition has not only brought together the game's best, but has also established itself as an event that stands for international goodwill and makes a positive, charitable impact across the globe. Unlike most sporting events, players are not paid for their participation in The Presidents Cup; there is no purse or prize money. Instead, each competitor designates charities or golf-related projects of his choice to receive a portion of the funds raised through the staging of each Presidents Cup.

In total, more than \$27 million has been distributed to approximately 425 charities in 15 countries since the inception of The Presidents Cup in 1994, including a record \$4.5 million from The Presidents Cup 2011. But more compelling than numbers and dollar figures are the stories from those whose lives have been touched by the generosity of the event's participants.

It's often said that The Presidents Cup represents all that is good about the game of golf: sportsmanship, international goodwill and friendly competition. When a sporting event is contested within this framework, there are only winners -- on and off the golf course -- no matter what the outcome of the competition.

Those who volunteer will receive a pass to that day's play, a parking permit and a free lunch. Shifts vary, and assuming we have ample people, there will be time for breaks to watch the play. Here are the shifts we need to fill:
