

He also fosters relationships with national foundations, businesses, elected officials, professional organizations and others who support Battelle for Kids' mission and provide financial support for various school improvement initiatives, research and evaluation studies, and ongoing efforts to create innovative tools and resources that improve teaching and learning for all students.

In his role as Senior Director of Development, Rick supports various project teams that serve school districts or coalitions of districts. He is a member of the Association of Fund Raising Professionals; the American Marketing Association; and the Columbus Rotary Club.
