Kristyn Hartman anchors the 5, 6 and 11 p.m. editions of 10TV News, along with Jerry Revish.

She previously worked at WBBM television in Chicago, where she served as an anchor and reporter for CB52 News for more than seven years. Prior to WBBM, Hartman anchored the news at WCCB-TV (Fox Charlotte) in Charlotte, North Carolina. Before working at stations in Phoenix, Arizona and Peoria, Illinois, Hartman began her career at KSNF-TV in Joplin, Missouri.

A fierce champion for community service, Hartman has spent much of her time out of the studio furthering causes of cancer research, education, prevention and support. She hopes to bring a chapter of the Pediatric Oncology Treasure Chest Foundation to Columbus.

In 2008 and 2009, showing her support for "Habitat for Humanity," she helped build a house for a family in need. In 2006, Hartman ran the Chicago Marathon in support of a "Team in Training" group supporting a young man in his fight against leukemia.

Hartman has enjoyed reading to students at various elementary schools and she also hopes to continue reaching out to children through reading. "Everywhere I've worked, I've made visiting classrooms a priority," she said. She also spent time at colleges, teaching a broadcast reporting and producing class for her alma mater, Northwestern University, and speaking occasionally at DePaul University.

In her spare time, Hartman says she loves being a student of the world. She has traveled to Germany, Italy, Costa Rica,

Focus on Kiwanis

We're introducing a new feature today - profiles of our new members. To balance out the freshest faces in our crowd we will soon have stories that feature our past presidents. Today, we start with a name we can all remember, but one we still doubt is real: **Joe Smith**.



Joe grew up in Fremont, Ohio, as the eighth of eleven children. He likes to tell people that he has such a common name because his parents were running out of ideas.

The minor detail of his life that almost nobody remembers is that Joe warmed the bench during one of the first state playoff games in Ohio, when Fremont St. Joe's lost to Middletown Fenwick in 1974. Apparently, Joe did so well at bench-warming that it got him noticed by Jim Tressel's dad, Lee, who recruited Joe to play at Baldwin Wallace College.

Joe left the Midwest to attend George Washington University, where he quickly accepted a work-study position with an upstart broadcast outlet in Washington, D.C., called National Public Radio. He joined the network two years before NPR made its first attempt at an early morning program, *Morning Edition*, a program that Joe would later produce.

Joe went on to become editor of NPR's Washington Bureau, where he was responsible for such noted reporters as Cokie Roberts, Nina Totenberg, Jim Angel and David Molpus. When Joe returned to Ohio in 1990, he became Senior Producer at WCPN-Cleveland Public Radio and the Ohio Bureau Chief of *Marketplace*, the weekday business program produced by what was then called Public Radio International.

Joe likes to tell people that he's the only person to report in the same year from the World Series and the Robert Casadesus International Piano Competition!

In 1999, Smith became the speechwriter and administrative assistant to Ohio Chief Justice Thomas J. Moyer, a position Joe held until Moyer passed away in April 2010. Joe held the same position for Chief Justice Eric Brown, who was appointed by Governor Ted Strickland to finish out Moyer's term. A low-ball estimate suggests that Joe wrote more than 400 speeches during his time at the court.

It was his passion for writing that led Smith to his current position at Paul Werth Associates, where he is the Director of Editorial Services. Joe is responsible for writing and editing for a broad range of clients, including those in higher education, health care and membership organizations.

But don't bother asking Joe about his work. He prefers talking about his son, Brian, who will graduate from New York University Law School next May. Brian already accepted an associate position with Davis Polk, where he will specialize in intellectual property law in the firm's Palo Alto, California office.

'Shred-it' Day a huge success ...

It's in the books. The fall session of 'Shred-it' Day was a tremendous success, due to the organizational efforts of **Scott Doellinger** and 20 Kiwanians, some of whom worked multiple shifts. In total, 3,540 vehicles came through the line and dropped off more than 180,000 pounds of paper to be shredded and recycled. That's the equivalent of 900 trees.
