Ohio Department of Veterans Affairs



Jason Dominguez was appointed interim director of the Ohio Department of Veterans Services by Governor John R. Kasich. He assumed his duties on July 22, 2013, following the retirement of director Thomas N. Moe. Jason had served as the assistant director and chief of staff of the department since February 1, 2011.

Jason is a two-time graduate of the Ohio State University, with a Bachelor of Arts in Economics and Master of Business Administration from the Fisher College of Business.

In 2005, Jason deployed to Al-Anbar Province, Iraq, with Lima Company, 3rd Battalion, 25th Marines. While part of Lima Company, he led his Marines through 12 major combat operations and 73 combat and security patrols. During that deployment, 22 Marines and one Navy Corpsman made the ultimate sacrifice, while 59 were awarded the Purple Heart.

After returning home from Iraq, Jason served as a Foreign Affairs and Military Legislative Aide for Congressman Patrick Tiberi in Washington, D.C. While working on Capitol Hill, he served on the founding board of the Congressional Military Service Members and Veterans Association in the U.S. House of Representatives. Prior to joining the Ohio Department of Veterans Services, Jason worked in Congressman Tiberi's district office as his military and veterans affairs case worker.

Jason Dominguez and wife Raven reside in Dublin, Ohio, with their son, Elijah Aiden, born May 10, 2012.





ACC sidewalk project ...

The project to repair the sidewalks surrounding the ACC Clubhouse has moved to the front of the building. For a short time, the main entrance to the Clubhouse will be closed and all members and guests will be directed to enter the Clubhouse through the Library door, just east of the main entrance. The Front Desk operation will also move to the Library to welcome and assist members and guests, until this project is completed (six to eight weeks). We appreciate your patience and cooperation during this time.



ELIMINATE Project update ...

As we enter the third year of our five-year campaign to raise \$110 million and to eliminate maternal and neo-natal tetanus in 39 countries, here is how we are doing and where we (Kiwanis International, Ohio District, Division 10-W and Kiwanis Club of Columbus) are headed:

- Globally, just over \$39.1 million has been raised in gifts and pledges, or about 35% of the \$110 million goal.
- Thirteen (13) countries have eliminated Maternal and Neonatal Tetanus since Kiwanis International joined with UNICEF in 2011. However 26 countries are left on the list, including India and Pakistan.
- Our Club (over \$130,000 raised and pledged) will be recognized as a Model Club at the October 29 Council meeting. Also, our Club, along with Grove City, Northwest and Washington Court House clubs, will be recognized for reaching the Bronze giving level (*at least \$350 average gift per member*).
- Division 10-W has raised about \$273,000 in gifts and pledges, which represents about 20 percent of the District total. The only other Division to top \$100,000 is Division 6.
- Ohio has raised about \$1.34 million in gifts and pledges.
- Our own Past President, **Ted Coons**, was recognized for his efforts on behalf of Eliminate.
- Ohio District Governor Jennifer DeFrance has established the following goals for her 2013-14 administrative year:
 - 1- 100 percent of members participate in Eliminate.
 - 2- 100 percent of clubs participate in Eliminate.
 - 3- Every club holds an Eliminate project fundraiser.
 - 4- Every division holds an Eliminate project fundraiser
