Dominic Cappa has been editor-in-chief of *Columbus Business First* since March 2000. He has been a business journalist, as a reporter and editor, for 26 years.

He returned to American City Business Journals Inc., the parent of *Business First*, in 1998 after serving as business editor and deputy business editor at the *Cincinnati Enquirer* and business editor of the *Poughkeepsie (N.Y.) Journal*.

Before that, Cappa was editor-in-chief of the *Philadelphia Business Journal*. He was the founding editor-in-chief of the *Business Journal of Charlotte* and was founding managing editor of *Business First of Buffalo*.

He began his career as a reporter for the *Niagara Falls (N.Y.) Gazette*, where he became city editor before being named news editor of the *Fort Myers (Fla.) News-Press*.

He and his newspapers have won numerous awards from organizations such as The Associated Press; Pennsylvania Press Association; New York State Press Association; Ohio Society of Professional Journalists; Society of American Business Editors and Writers; and the Press Club of Cleveland. He is also a two-time recipient of the Eagle Award from American City Business Journals, the company's highest honor.

Cappa is a 1976 graduate of St. Bonaventure University, where he received a bachelor's degree in journalism. He is a native of Rochester, New York.

Focus on Kiwanis

A Growing relationship ...

This year, we will be partnering with Boys & Girls Clubs of America (BGCA) on its National Year of Service (*for the Boys & Girls Club, the "year" begins in January 2014*). The Boys & Girls Clubs National Year of Service goal is **to engage one million youth in one million hours of community service**.

Community Service ... Youth ... Does this sound like our mission? This partnership will be a great way for us to achieve our mission of serving children by engaging them in opportunities to serve their community and learn through the experience by working along with us. The Boys and Girls Club has staff dedicated to these programs, providing leadership and guidance in working with us.

With that in mind, **we are looking for three volunteers to support these efforts** through Key Clubs and Builders Clubs. They will be working with the staff at the Westside Club (Gift Street), at the Milo-Grogan Club (Cleveland Avenue) and at KIPP: Connect Boys & Girls Club (Myrtle Avenue) at the KIPP Journey Academy (*KIPP: Knowledge Is Power Program*). Builders Clubs serve middle-school students and Key Clubs serve high-school students.

At each site, we need to schedule an initial meeting with our volunteers, site staff and youth between Thanksgiving and the end of the year to begin to outline opportunities, especially for the Martin Luther King focus in mid-January.

The time commitment **involves about three hours each month** (about two hours of meeting/instruction time interacting with the youth and staff once a month, and perhaps an hour of administrative time throughout the month). Other of our Club's volunteers would be involved as other opportunities evolve.

The programs' objectives will be to participate in six national service opportunities, including: MLK Day of Service (Jan. 20, 2014); Kiwanis One Day (April 5 in partnership with BGCA and Nickelodeon); United We Serve (Summer 2014); National Day of Service and Remembrance (September 11, 2014); Worldwide Day of Play (October 2014); and National Family Week (Thanksgiving 2014).

These service days will give kids an opportunity to focus on service learning, the environment, family service, the avoidance of summer "learning loss" and physical activity.



c1916: A vignette ...

The Kiwanis Club of Columbus was born in 1916. This is one of a series of articles highlighting other important events that occurred in this time period.

In 1916, much of the world was in turmoil as the Great War entered its third year. Woodrow Wilson was re-elected with the campaign slogan, "He kept us out of war." However, the U.S. entered the war in 1917, and by 1918 had a million troops in Europe. The large-scale mobilization was evident in Columbus, as the Ohio statehouse grounds became a military encampment.



Columbus was affected by the war in numerous ways. Among the notable consequences beyond the sacrifice of so many young men's lives, was a lashing out against the German culture that was such a central part of our city's history. Schiller Park was renamed Washington Park, and all streets with German names were renamed with English ones; the instruction of German in the public schools was made illegal; great bonfires were held at Broad and High and at the foot of Schiller's statue in German Village to burn books in the German language; and Boy Scout troops burned German newspapers.

Throughout the country, German opera and orchestral music were driven from the concert halls; German newspapers were required to run certified English translations of articles about the war; and church services conducted in German in German-American communities were banned. It was against the chaotic background of war that our Club began its great journey.

Veterans Day ...



World War I – known at the time as “The Great War” - officially ended when the Treaty of Versailles was signed on June 28, 1919, in the Palace of Versailles outside the town of Versailles, France. However, fighting ceased seven months earlier when an armistice, or temporary cessation of hostilities, between the Allied nations and Germany went into effect on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. For that reason, November 11, 1918, is generally regarded as the end of “the war to end all wars.”

In November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11 as the first commemoration of Armistice Day. The original concept for the celebration was for a day observed with parades and public meetings and a brief suspension of business beginning at 11:00 a.m.

The Uniform Holiday Bill (Public Law 90-363 (82 Stat. 250)) was signed on June 28, 1968, and was intended to ensure three-day weekends for Federal employees by celebrating four national holidays on Mondays: Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, Veterans Day and Columbus Day. It was thought that these extended weekends would encourage travel, recreational and cultural activities and stimulate greater industrial and commercial production. Many states did not agree with this decision and continued to celebrate the holidays on their original dates.

In 1978, the annual observance of Veterans Day was returned to its original date of November 11. This action supported the desires of the overwhelming majority of state legislatures, all major veterans service organizations and the American people. Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans Day to November 11 not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: A celebration to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.
