

Executive Director & CEO Recreation Unlimited Foundation

Paul L. Huttlin is the Executive Director & CEO of Recreation Unlimited Foundation; Recreation Unlimited Farm and Fun; and Ashley Campus Support, all three 501(c) 3 not-for-profit organizations serving individuals with disabilities and health concerns.



Paul's contribution to the success of the Recreation Unlimited companies is immeasurable. Starting in 1997, he has led Recreation Unlimited to become the leader in the area of camp programs for individuals with disabilities and health concerns. From the thousands of individuals being served to the multitude of programs and to the 195-acre campus, Paul's leadership has touched every one of those areas and the success that they have achieved.

In addition to being the Executive Director & CEO for the three Recreation Unlimited organizations, he is also the chief fundraiser and chief marketing officer. Recreation Unlimited is proud to be a debt-free organization. Most recently, Paul and his team raised more than \$2.5 million, which was used for the renovation of the three residence halls; a creative center; welcome center; the welcome center fountain and gardens; the dining hall; the lodge and a new accessible and universal playground. In 2008, the 20,000 sq. ft. Life Center was completed with \$2.4 million raised. All projects were completed on time and under budget.

In addition to his career at Recreation Unlimited, Paul also served on the Governor's Council for People with Disabilities, is a current council member for the Delaware Licensing Council, and is the current chairperson of PACE Environmental Health Committee sponsored by the Delaware Health Department. He was a two-time finalist award winner for 'Entrepreneur of the Year' in the not-for-profit area.

Progress made possible by generosity ...

Kiwanis-family members around the world have raised more than \$75.5 million as of February 16, 2015. We are well on our way to raising \$110 million through The ELIMINATE Project to protect women and babies from maternal and neonatal

tetanus (MNT). And for that, we thank you – each and every one of the donors who have contributed to our success.



Remember, every gift makes a tremendous difference to families around the world. These critical funds will help UNICEF implement immunization activities in some of the most remote areas of the world. In fact, Mauritania conducted its maternal and neonatal tetanus elimination validation survey last month to determine if MNT has successfully been eliminated; it is currently awaiting the results.

In early 2015, immunization campaigns plan to reach nearly **5.3 million women** of reproductive age. The Tetanus Toxoid Supplemental Immunization Activities (TT SIAs) updates below are examples of the work made possible through generous donors like Kiwanis members.

Chad intends to implement a round of TT SIAs in April, reaching approximately 1.6 million women in 42 districts.

Guinea Conakry will conduct additional activities in 2015.

Haiti's district of Sud-East will complete its final round in July 2015.

Nigeria is scheduled to conduct a second round of tetanus immunization campaigns, aiming to reach 2.3 million women in early 2015.

Papua New Guinea has planned final campaigns in 15 provinces in 2015.

Sudan has scheduled a first round of tetanus immunization campaign aiming to reach one million women in April 2015.

Ethiopia has scheduled the third rounds of TT SIAs in January/February and July/August 2015, respectively, reaching approximately 367,858 women in four zones of the Somali region.

The **Philippines**, **Cambodia** and **Equatorial Guinea** have all scheduled validation surveys this year to determine if MNT has successfully been eliminated.

Our goal is in sight: a world where mothers do not have to worry about losing newborns to tetanus. Thank you for helping Kiwanis change the world.

"Shred-It" day ...

The annual spring "Shred-It" day, coordinated by WCMH-TV4, has been scheduled for Saturday, May 2, at the parking lots at Crew Stadium.



This event draws thousands of cars dropping off boxes and bags filled with sensitive documents (bank statements, cancelled checks, etc.) their owners wish to have

professionally shredded. The event will run from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., and Kiwanis Club of Columbus will again play a major role in staffing the effort. Since the first NBC-4 "Shred-It" day (2003), 2,128 tons of personal documents have been shredded and recycled, and \$96,170 has been raised for Nationwide Children's Hospital.

We need to provide 15 or more volunteers for each of three shifts: 7:30 a.m. to 10 a.m.; 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 12:30 p.m. to 3 p.m. Snacks and lunch will be provided. Family members, co-workers, neighbors and friends are welcome to join us. Most of the duties will involve unloading boxes and bags from the trunks of cars (lifting) and carrying them over to the Shred-It trucks. Other light duties are available directing traffic.
