Peter Pavarini is a partner in the global law firm of Squire Sanders (US) LLP. He focuses his practice on the representation of hospitals and other health care providers in a wide range of strategic, regulatory and transactional matters, particularly physician alignment models and the development of clinically integrated provider organizations. Mr. Pavarini has devoted his entire legal career to addressing the challenges and opportunities presented by regulatory reforms and marketplace trends. He has been listed in Best Lawyers in America for health care since 1991 and has been recognized by his peers in numerous other surveys and directories.

Mr. Pavarini serves on the board of directors of the American Health Lawyers Association, is a member of its Executive and Nominating Committees and currently chairs its Finance Committee. He will serve as AHLA's president from 2014-15. Mr. Pavarini is a member of the faculty for the American College of Healthcare Executives and a frequent speaker/ author on the transformation of the U.S. health care system. Personal growth through volunteerism ...

He was recently recognized for this accomplishment by being named to the inaugural class of AHLA's Pro Bono Champions. He has also served on the boards of numerous charities including Goodwill Columbus, the Friends of the Homeless and Three Strands (which is developing a new surgical hospital in the Central African Republic). When not practicing law, Mr. Pavarini has performed bluegrass and various forms of Americana music with three other lawyers at charitable events since 1996.

Mr. Pavarini has taught at the collegiate and post-graduate levels since 1979, including The Ohio State University Fisher School of Business, Capital University Law School and Park College. He has served as the editor-in-chief of *United States Health Care Laws and Rules*, the legal editor of the *Journal of the American Academy of Urgent Care Medicine*, and the editor in chief of the *Health Law Journal of Ohio*.

Before entering private law practice in 1981, Mr. Pavarini served as an Attorney-Advisor in the Office of General Counsel of the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services in Washington, D.C. He is a 1977 graduate of the Boston College Law School, and received his B.A. *summa cum laude* from State University of New York at Albany in 1973. He is a member of the Ohio, North Carolina, and District of Columbia Bars.
