With Sullivan’s leadership and well-known expertise in the business of golf, The Memorial Tournament continues its strong reputation as one of the most prestigious and well-regarded tournaments on the PGA Tour.

The Memorial Tournament presented by Nationwide Insurance is held annually at Muirfield Village Golf Club in Dublin, Ohio, a suburb of Columbus. The Tournament, which was founded and is hosted by Jack Nicklaus, is conducted each year with three goals in mind: To honor the memory of individuals, living and deceased, who have distinguished themselves in the game of golf; to showcase the world’s best golfers competing on one of the most challenging venues in the world for the enjoyment of spectators; and to benefit charitable organizations in central Ohio.

Sullivan is also president and managing partner of HNS Sports Group, a golf management company specializing in event and hospitality management, sponsorship representation and relationship counseling. Previously, he held various sales and business development positions with The Memorial Tournament and Jack Nicklaus Family associated companies, Golden Bear and Executive Sports International. He began his career with Great American Broadcasting prior to joining The Memorial Tournament.

Sullivan holds a Bachelor of Science (business marketing) degree from Miami University.

President's Corner

Mitch Albom, the award winning author and newspaper columnist has a brand new book out entitled, "The Time Keeper." It is a fictional account of the creation of time. Now that's what I call putting some chronology into a chronology! It reminds me that we all mark time in our own way, at our own pace, and with our own methods.

For Kate and me, the most visual measure of time we have is a moving, thriving, constantly changing, in various stages and fits and starts, gang of five not as little as they once were children. We have the chance to see them at their very best and their most vulnerable but there is no greater joy than to watch them stretch and turn towards the light in becoming who God calls them each individually to be. It is the essence of joy.

Serving as President of our Club has been an "essence of joy" experience for me. One thing's certain: This year has gone by in a blink, balanced with the blend of all we have accomplished in our 96 years, and excited about the prospects of what comes next contemplating change and how our Club continues to make our vision and mission a reality.

At the beginning of this administrative year, we set 3 goals. I thought it fitting to share how we fared on each of the three.

10 percent increase in service hours – Impact in Community

Thanks to a tremendous spirit of service we not only met our goal to increase service hours by 10 percent from 672 total hours to 740, we smashed through it. We don't have the final-final tally, but we are well over 1,100 total service hours, an increase of more than 60 percent. More important than the numbers, this is the heart of our mission and truly the way we are at our best in changing the world, one child at a time. Special thanks due to **Kathleen Roberts** in serving as our "Team Leader" on our service efforts.

10 percent increase in membership

We set a minimum goal of 10 percent or 16 new members, and a stretch goal of 40 new members. This proved a tough calling. At present, we have 14 new members, with the prospect of one more for approval at our last trustee meeting for the year. Importantly, we have learned a lot, and the membership teams are doing great work – something that will provide momentum for the year ahead! While it appears we won't quite make the mark, we've made tremendous progress and I'm thankful to **Joyce Waters** for her thoughtful and energetic leadership.

10 percent increase in fundraising revenues

As we focus on our 2016 goals and our larger strategic plan,

one of the areas of focus we concentrated on this past year was considering how we might balance achieving our Club's strategic plan (growing Foundation assets to \$1.1 million by 2016 and giving back an additional \$100,000 to the community in that year) along with active participation in the Kiwanis International ELIMINATE project. We believe we are on a path that will enable us to achieve our Club goals and, at the same time, fulfill our pledge of approximately \$130,000 to the ELIMINATE project – to rid the world of the scourge of maternal and neo-natal tetanus.

Our Auction and Regatta efforts were excellent events that continued to build Club esprit de corps and a sense of giving back to the community – but we fell short of our goal of growing revenue 10 percent - actually experiencing a small decrease from last year's net proceeds. (We brought in about \$53,500 from the combined events this year, compared to \$57,400 last year, a decrease of more than 6 percent).

However, we also launched in the midst of our other activities, a brand new 5K running event to raise funds for ELIMINATE, and it holds great promise as a possible Columbus area tradition, "brought to you by Kiwanis."

All in all, there is much to celebrate, and even more to look forward to, as next week we welcome **Lisa Jolley** as our new President. She will be an incredible leader, taking us to the next level and preparing us for a future worthy of our glorious past.

Now, a true confession: My last temptation as President was to write an entire column about the example of service our Club Secretary **Paul Bohlman** provides. But he edits this column each week, and my fear was, given his true humility, that he would replace anything singing his praises with the jokes he finds for our newsletter each week. And let's face it, there are only so many of those we can encounter at once.

In all earnestness, I'm incredibly grateful for Paul's friendship, his tireless devotion and his commitment to make us "better still, tomorrow." We are fortunate to have a friend like Paul.

Finally, thanks to all of you for allowing me the chance to serve beside you. It has been an honor, and I know, something I will always cherish.

WD-40, a versatile ally ...

What is the main ingredient of WD-40? Few people know.

I had a neighbor who bought a new pickup. I got up very early one Sunday morning and saw that someone had spray painted red all around the sides of his beige truck. I went over, woke him up and told him the bad news. He was very upset and was trying to figure out what to do ... probably nothing until Monday morning, since nothing was open. Another neighbor came out and told him to get his WD-40 and clean it off. Amazingly, it removed the unwanted paint and did not harm the original paint job. I was impressed!

WD-40 ... who knew? 'Water Displacement #40.' WD-40 was created in 1953 by three technicians at the San Diego Rocket Chemical Company. The product began from a search for a rust preventative solvent and degreaser to protect missile parts. Its name comes from the project that was to find a 'water displacement' compound. They were successful with the 40th formulation, thus WD-40. The Convair Company bought it in bulk to protect their Atlas missile parts. Ken East (one of the original founders) says there is nothing in WD-40 that would hurt you. When you read the 'shower door' part, try it. It's the first thing that has ever cleaned that spotty shower door. If yours is plastic, it works just as well as glass. It's a miracle! Then try it on your stove top ... Voila! It's now shinier than it's ever been. You'll be amazed. Here are some WD-40 uses:

1. Protects silver from tarnishing.
2. Removes road tar and grime from cars.
3. Cleans and lubricates guitar strings.
4. Gives floors that 'just-waxed' sheen without making them slippery.
5. Keeps flies off cows. (I love this one!)
6. Restores and cleans chalkboards.
7. Removes lipstick stains.
8. Loosens stubborn zippers.
9. Untangles jewelry chains.
10. Removes stains from stainless steel sinks.
11. Removes dirt and grime from the barbecue grill.
12. Keeps ceramic/terra cotta garden pots from oxidizing.
13. Removes tomato stains from clothing.
14. Keeps glass shower doors free of water spots.
15. Camouflages scratches in ceramic and marble floors.
16. Keeps scissors working smoothly.
17. Lubricates noisy door hinges on vehicles and doors in homes.
18. It removes black scuff marks from the kitchen floor! Use WD-40 for those nasty tar and scuff marks on flooring. It doesn't seem to harm the finish and you won't have to scrub nearly as hard to get them off.
19. Bug guts will eat away the finish on your car if not removed quickly! Use WD-40!
20. Gives a children's playground gym slide a shine for a super-fast slide.
21. Lubricates gearshift and mower deck lever for ease of handling on riding mowers...
22. Rids kids' rocking chairs and swings of squeaky noises.
23. Lubricates tracks in sticking home windows and makes them easier to open...
24. Spraying an umbrella stem makes it easier to open and close.
25. Restores and cleans padded leather dashboards in vehicles, as well as vinyl bumpers.
26. Restores and cleans roof racks on vehicles.
27. Lubricates and stops squeaks in electric fans.
28. Lubricates wheel sprockets on tricycles, wagons and bicycles for easy handling
29. Lubricates fan belts on washers and dryers, and keeps them running smoothly.
30. Keeps rust from forming on saws and saw blades, and other tools.
31. Removes splattered grease on stove.
32. Keeps bathroom mirror from fogging.
33. Lubricates prosthetic limbs.
34. Keeps pigeons off the balcony (they hate the smell).
35. Removes all traces of duct tape.
36. Folks even spray it on their arms, hands, and knees to relieve arthritis pain.

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## Run your refrigerator efficiently ...

A refrigerator uses more electricity than any other appliance in your house, as it is always on. There are several ways to operate a refrigerator that will minimize the use of energy.

The University of Florida states that seven percent of all electricity used by a refrigerator is to cool-down warm air entering when the door is open. Over a year's time, this 50 to 120 kWh of power is equivalent to running a dishwasher 20 times, on the low-end, to using a washing machine 50 times, on the high-end.

So, don't plan dinner with the door open. Close the door as you pour milk on your breakfast cereal. Be sure the door is not being held open by a container of something that 'almost fits' in there. Wipe down the door gaskets, to allow good sealing of the magnetic gasket to the metal cabinet. Replace a gasket when any wear occurs. Additional energy savings can be achieved by returning items removed from the refrigerator as soon as possible, so less energy is needed to re-cool them.

Finally, allow hot items to cool before placing them in the refrigerator. An example is freshly brewed ice tea. A small savings, you say? With more than 100 million refrigerators in the United States, the savings could equal our largest power plant running at full capacity for two weeks!

Shut the door, silly, and save some money and a planet!
