

"The Ohio Nurseryman," Fred Hower, is an educator and certified arborist with more than 45 years' experience as a horticultural consultant and landscape designer. The author of more than 400 columns in 90 newspapers, Fred also hosts the radio show, "Plant Talk," which is carried on more than 20 radio stations throughout Ohio. He also teaches in the horticulture department at Columbus State Community College. Fred is author of the book, "Tree and Shrub Gardening for Ohio," which is available at major bookstores through the U.S. In addition, Fred serves on a variety of councils and boards for the Ohio Nursery and Landscape Association; the City of Worthington; The Ohio State University Chadwick Arboretum; Columbus State Arboretum; Columbus State Community College; and the *Columbus Dispatch* Central Ohio Home and Garden Show.



A graduate of The Ohio State University, Fred has a B.S. in Ornamental Horticulture. He has received the Meritorious Service Award from the Ohio Nursery and Landscape Association; the first Senior Careerist Award from The Ohio State University Department of Horticulture and Crop Science; three Grand Awards for Landscape Design from the Ohio Nursery and Landscape Association; the Award of Merit from the International Society of Arborculture; and a PLAN award for landscape design from the Junior League of Columbus. Fred has also been active in the Ohio Nursery and Landscape Association; the Columbus Landscape Association; the Southwestern Ohio Environmental Horticultural Association; the International Society of Arborculture; and is an honorary member of the Ohio Landscaper's Association.

Fred works as a horticultural design consultant for residential and business properties. He is a guest speaker at numerous gardening events throughout Ohio each year and has spoken to our Club on a regular basis.
