## Reverend Dr. Tracy R. Keenan

Sr. Pastor of Covenant Presbyterian Church



The Reverend Dr. Tracy Keenan is the senior pastor of Covenant Presbyterian Church, a congregation of 700 members located in Upper Arlington, Ohio. A native of Pittsburgh, she received a Bachelor of Science in Education from Duquesne University, a Master of Divinity from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary and a Doctor of Ministry in Preaching from McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. She served at three Pittsburgh-area Presbyterian churches where she was also active in Interfaith Ministries and Presbytery commissions. She spent two summers in Belfast, Northern Ireland as a Volunteer in Mission.

She supplements her preaching skills with great musical talent. She has recorded original workshop music and she will be the music leader for the national gathering of Presbyterian women next summer.

Tracy was called to Covenant in 2004 where she enthusiastically lends her musical background to ministry and to the Church at large, leading seminars and worship leadership for various Synod, Presbytery and seminary events. She is presently serving on the Committee on Ministry for the Presbytery of Scioto Valley. She has greatly energized and inspired the Covenant congregation and was recently recognized in a *Columbus Dispatch* article on dynamic preachers.



Tracy is married to Jim Mehler, pastor of Central Presbyterian in downtown Columbus. They have two grown daughters.

### President's Corner ...

Last week, several Club members served as "principal for a day" in Columbus City Schools. I was assigned an elementary school in which almost all of the children qualify for food assistance, and the neighborhood does not have a good reputation. I really had no idea what to expect from the administration, the teachers or the students. Since the only recent experience I have with elementary school is with my son, who is in second grade at a school deemed "excellent" by the state's grading system, I naturally expected to compare and contrast the two.

Meeting with the administrators, staff and students was both inspiring and heartbreaking. The administration was experienced, engaged and caring and the "regular" principal was respected by students and staff alike. The building was modern and friendly and outfitted with a large multi-use computer lab. The students welcomed me by looking me in the eye and shaking my hand. The teachers were enthusiastic and moved right into their lessons for the day. To my surprise, there was little difference between what happened inside that building and what my second grader may be experiencing at the same time. However, as the day went on, I realized there was a huge difference in these kids' education and there was no easy fix for the problem.

A couple of fourth and fifth graders looked like they had been up all night, faced with who knows what in the neighborhood. Others just didn't quite have their uniforms clean or together, maybe a job that was just too much at home. I talked to teachers who had to track down parents to get them to have a conference about their child, and it was clear that most of the kids learned only during the day and in the safe oasis of the school. Busy parents with second-shift jobs or other family barriers are societal problems outside of the school that are contributing greatly in holding these kids back.

I, for one, will return to "my" school for the day to deliver

new games for the "morning circle" kids who get a free breakfast and start the day together in a safe, warm and loving atmosphere. I will also contribute to the school's "store," where kids who have done something good are rewarded with a choice of prizes. I will do this as a 'thank you' from our Club for allowing me to share a day with them. We will continue to see if one of our own Kiwanis-branded programs would be a fit there, as well. In the meantime, we are laying the groundwork for a partnership with our local Boys and Girls Clubs, so that we might be a small part of the solution and make an impact for some of these children. If we can provide other positive opportunities for any of the precious children I led as their "principal for a day" or children similarly situated, I will truly have something to be thankful for this Thanksgiving.

**Sumner Dent Williams**, age 84, of Reynoldsburg, died November 9 at the Manor at Whitehall. We knew him simply as “Dent” and for many years he served our Club admirably as Club Secretary.

Born April 15, 1924 in Bridgeport, Ohio, son of Dorothy Williams. He is survived Edna, his loving wife of 61 years, sons Steve, Kerry (Betsy); daughter, Lisa (Steve); grandchildren, Kelly (Tom), Aaron (Loni), Jason (Lisa), Alix (Micah), Zachary, Stephen, Erik, Kaitlin, Trevor, Jordan and Jacob.

During World War II, Dent served in the U.S. Navy aboard the U.S.S. Metcalf (1942-1946) and received many honors. He graduated from Ohio University in 1949 with a B.S. in Journalism and worked as a reporter for the *Columbus Citizen* newspaper. Dent retired after many years as Public Relations Manager at Rockwell International (formerly North American Aviation).

In addition to being a member of our Kiwanis Club, Dent belonged to the National Management Association and Ohio Press Club. He loved reading, gardening, woodworking and a challenging crossword puzzle. He was humble, faithful, unselfish and kind, a loving husband, father and grandfather. He was the strength and heart of his family and will be dearly missed by all who knew and loved him.
